A world in transition

The Summer School is organized in the frame of the project "Atlas of Transitions, New Geographies for a Cross-Cultural Europe" (<u>http://www.atlasoftransitions.eu/</u>), focused on the role of culture and performing arts in promoting reciprocity, re-appropriation of public spaces and intercultural dialogue in European cities.

Through performative practices, the project intends to challenge the stereotypical imagery conveyed by the mediatisation of contemporary migratory phenomena, working on new ways of perceiving public spaces and coexistence between European citizens, migrants and refugees. The project is promoted by theaters, NGOs, research centers and universities based in 7 Eu countries:

Description

The Summer School offers an interdisciplinary course on international migration, performing arts and public space. The aim is to discuss theoretical frameworks, methodologies and artistic practices focused on the role of performing arts in promoting space of resistance and creative intervention in the public space, questioning the relationship between arts and activism.

Involving world-wide scholars, artists, institutions and collective experiences, the course will offer an overview on the role played by performing arts in developing alternative imageries on migration, spaces of urban participation, collective memory and aesthetics of subversion.



Structure

The Summer School offers lessons, good practices presentations, artistic performances, roundtables, open lectures, classroom project works and field works/visits.

Structure:

- Public: open lectures, performances, concerts.
- Private: class lessons, external activities and field visits, case studies, project work.

This 5-day intensive summer school will offer a fullimmersion on how creativity and intercultural exchange can sustain more welcoming and inclusive

cities.



Course objectives

- Understand contemporary migration in its complexity through a critical approach
- Understand and deconstruct actual narratives on migration
- Be familiar with main theoretical perspectives to understand international migration and asylum seeking, with a special focus on narratives, mobility and citizenship
- Learn relevant empirical knowledge on the relation between performing arts, migration and public space

- Reflect on the role of performing arts in tackling migration in urban contexts
- Work on innovative interdisciplinary methodologies
- Get to know artistic projects around the world focused on migration
- Develop a work project in collaboration with lecturers, artists and other participants
- Be engaged in a transnational network of experts on the topic

Skill development

- Critical thinking on the relationship between theories, practices and methods on performing art and migration
- Collaborative thinking in interdisciplinary and intercultural teams
- Understanding of the relationship between creative practices and management of cultural diversity
- Development of skills in conceptualizing and realizing interdisciplinary projects in the context of performing arts and migration
- Development of creative skills to address current challenges on international migration and inclusive methods and policies
- Elaborate a creative project (project work)

Director of the Research Unit in Public Culture at The University of Melbourne, Professor in the School of Culture and Communication at The University of Melbourne and founder with Scott McQuire - of the Spatial Aesthetics research cluster. He is Project Leader of the Australian Research Council Linkage Project, 'Large Screens and the Transnational Public Sphere'

Professor of Media and Communications at the London School of Economics and Political Sciences. Her research focuses on the ethical and political challenges of communicating human suffering in the media. She has published on four main domains: disaster news; humanitarian campaigns and celebrity advocacy; war and conflict reporting; migration.

He is Visiting Fellow at the London School of Economics and Political Science, Research Fellow at the Institute for Public Knowledge-New York University, and at Monash University (Melbourne). Author of several books and papers in the field of migration, borders, human rights, media communication, he is currently the scientific coordinator of Atlas of Transitions. Performing arts curator, dramaturge and theorist at IUAV - University of Venice. Her theoretical interests range from postdramatic theatre to practices in curating. She has hold seminars in international research centres/Universities (Hong Kong, Roma, Shanghai, London, Singapore, Montréal, Amsterdam, New York City, Philadelphia). For more than ten years she has been Romeo Castellucci's closest theoretical collaborator and dramaturge. She is currently the artistic director of Atlas of Transitions Biennale (Bologna 2018-2020).

Theatre director, scriptwriter, scenographer, actor. In 1993 he establishes 'Teatro dell 'Argine' (Bologna) where he is the president and artistic director for many years. He founded 'The Company of the Refugees', a group of non-professional actors who play theater workshop to 'meet' different cultures. In 2014, the Refugee Theater Company becomes independent and changes its name to 'Cantieri Meticci'. He has directed theatre projects in various countries of Europe, Africa, South America and Middle East
